## **1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY**

### **Curricular Aspects**

Ever since its inception in 1975, Apeejay has been striving to steer the youth of the region towards a promising future by empowering them with the rich Indian Arts and Culture as also the much needed professional impetus to ensure their befitting placements. With this well slated mission and vision, Apeejay has always been marching ahead of its times. After being the only Institution in the City dedicated to the promotion and propagation of Fine Arts, Apeejay pioneered to introduce the latest courses catering to the fast emerging sectors.

### **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

Apeejay follows a transparent and systematic admission policy which is effectively publicised through the College Prospectus, College Website and other well devised mechanism formulated for the same. The admission process adheres to GNDU, UGC and State Govt. Norms. Admission Counselling Committee counsels the students seeking admission to the College and guides them for making the right choice as per their aptitude, potential and passion.

Students of various professional and technical courses are encouraged to take up research based projects. Use of accounting and statistical software is encouraged among students from relevant streams. Exposure to simulators is given to students which imitate real life scenarios. Seminars, Workshops, Exhibitions, Guest Lectures, Demonstrations, Live Performances and Presentations augment a most appropriate teachinglearning experience. International Collaborations, Link-Ups, Industrial Visits provide the much needed exposure and hands-on experience to our students.

Apeejay's teaching-learning and evaluation methodology incorporates the mechanism of systematic lesson plan along with class tests, assignments, formulation of academic calendar and the prospective plan for the session. Monitoring is done through Moodle, recently introduced online software which serves to be an efficient platform for being in regular touch with students, to keep proper follow up and to communicate post academic evaluation updates to them.

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the College ensures the internal quality enhancement of the College through the proper and timely implementation of all policies related to teaching-learning and evaluation

### **Research, Innovations and Extension**

Apeejay's journey over the last few years has been marked by an exemplary growth in the field of Research, Innovations and Extension activities. Post its re-accreditation, there has been a phenomenal rise in the number of faculty members who have received their Ph. D Degrees and also in the number of teachers pursuing the same. ### **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

## 2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

- Few simulators like MATLAB and statistical packages also help in securing high quality work.
- Students are encouraged for paper presentations, article writing, stage shows, performances on A.I.R, Doordarshan etc. also letters/articles to Editors in leading newspapers.
- Scholarships and awards are bestowed on meritorious students in mid-term and University exams.
- Special coaching is imparted to advanced learners to help them excel in University exams.
- Special sections of classes for advanced learners provide healthy inter-class competition, sharing and exchange of knowledge.
- Students are encouraged and motivated to participate in Inter-national level, national, state level and zonal competitions
- Skill development classes for advance learners to participate in technical competitions such as “Plasma”, Synergy, Techfest, etc.
- Placement cell prepares the eligible students for company based Aptitude Test which includes

group discussions, interview and MCQ's.

- Students are encouraged to undertake research projects and get their research papers published in conferences and seminars.
- Students are motivated to take up online MOOC courses in relevant streams.
- Professional experts are arranged to train advance learners for various competitions in addition to the faculty.
- Special tutorial classes are given to advance learners for achieving merit in university.
- Competitive books and magazines are made available in the College Library.
- The college has various students' bodies at departmental levels to provide ample opportunities for skill enhancement and overall growth.
- Peer Teaching is encouraged where advanced learners are motivated to teach the juniors.
- Advanced learners are encouraged to participate in State, National and International level workshops, seminars and International Exchange Programmes etc.

## 2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

#### Response:

College emphasizes on skill based learning for it believes, where there is a skill, there is a way. Skills developed in a proper manner open sesame to a promising future. Experiential learning is a powerful way to address student's growth and potential.

To incur this, Apeejay adopts following methods:

- A teacher uses realistic scenarios relevant to the content which engages students and learners in the subject to make it interesting. For this, field trips, studio visits, industrial visit are arranged frequently which explains the real application of their subject.
- Students are engaged using visuals such as MOOC courses video lectures, SWAYAM and e-pathshala are initiated in classrooms.

- Internal evaluation of the students is a continuous process and the performance of the students is judged continuously in classrooms through special tests, assignments, group discussions, paper presentations etc.
- Formation of dedicated Examination Committee which prepares the examination academic calendar and strictly adheres to it for seamless conduction of exams and smooth evaluation process of students.
- Multiple Choice Questions and objective questions are included in the assignments to prepare the students for competitive exams.
- Online tests are conducted at department level through MOODLE at regular intervals.
- The examination committee trains the staff on invigilation duty for midterm exams through orientation programmes for the smooth conduct of internal exams.
- Question papers of the midterm exams are exactly inline with the pattern of the university exams.
- The answer sheets of the students for mid-term exams are cross checked by heads of the departments for fair evaluation. The HODs randomly select a few answer sheets for the purpose.
- Answer sheets are made available to the students and discussed with them to procure their improvement.
- Mock viva and mock practical exams are conducted shortly before the commencement of the final exams to prepare the students for the coming university practical.
- The result compilation is fully automated which results in timely delivery of report cards.
- Students' performance report is prepared and discussed with teachers during department meetings. The weak cases are discussed with the Principal. Remedies for improvement are initiated.
- Record of the student performance in the mid terms and class assignments is duly maintained of the student in the college for monitoring the growth of the student in classes and midterm exams.
- Parents are informed about the performance of the students.
- Students with outstanding performance are awarded in College Annual Function.
- The students who do not meet the necessary conditions are strictly dealt with. A proper monitoring process is followed and their timely submission of assignments is ensured.
- Transparent and robust mechanism of internal assessment ensures proper continuous evaluation of students' performance.

### 2.5.2 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and variety

#### Response:

A well framed criterion is maintained to channelize internal assessment in professional courses which includes:

- **Regularity of the students in the class rooms – 20% Weightage:** It is mandatory for the students to attend 75% lectures. Attendance is uploaded on GNDU portal. Those students who do not meet the eligibility conditions are required to attend extra classes. Students who have attendance 90% above are given extra credit in internal assessment and practical exams.
- **Originality and creativity of the assignment of the project work – 20% Weightage:** There are some courses in which project work is mandatory e.g. B.Des (Multimedia, Fashion Textile and Interior), B.F.A., B.Sc (IMT), etc. Students whose project work is original and creative are given extra weightage in internal assessment and practical exams.
- **Presentation techniques – 20% Weightage:** Presentation techniques are very essential for befitting placements. Students are given special training to learn the most appropriate techniques for presentation. Students who excel in their presentations are amply awarded through extra weightage in internal assessment.
- **Timely submission of Project works, Class assignments and Performance in practical sessions – 35% Weightage:** Classroom teaching involves judging the ability, progress and growth of the students through class tests, assignments and projects. Students with satisfactory performance are given extra credit. Extra coaching is given to the slow learners to bring them to the level of advanced learners.
- **Contribution to College activities and personal behaviour – 5% Weightage:** The college believes in the wholesome development of personality of each and every student. Various activities are organised in the college to provide them ample opportunities to showcase and enhance their talent. Students are also involved in becoming the members of various bodies which not only contribute to smooth functioning of the college but also inculcate the feeling of belongingness to the institution. Stress is laid on moral and human values as also grooming the personal behaviour of the students. Students with good behaviour and active participation in college activities and youth festivals are given extra credit in internal assessment and practicals.

Other prime metrics for assessing student's achievement include:

1. Performance in midterm exams
2. Performance in Mock viva and mock practicals
3. Participation in Industrial Visits
4. Regular use of library by the students.
5. Student's participation in Book reviews

- In case of totalling error or unmarked cases, timely correction is done by teacher and also updated in the office as the report generation is automated and centralized.

**At University Level:**

- The rechecking and revaluation forms are available online, students can apply for it through college.
- University provides provision for re-evaluation within 15 days of declaration of results. If any lapse is found on the part of the evaluator the University takes action against the evaluator.
- University also provides a provision of re-appear if the student has more than 20% marks.
- Special chance to appear in the exams is also provided to the students in case of any emergency.
- Grievances at the University level are sent to the university after recommendation by the Principal.
- If the question paper is out of syllabus then corrective measures are taken by the university in the form of grace marks or re-conducting of exams.

**2.5.4 The institution adheres to the academic calendar for the conduct of CIE****Response:**

- Apeejay adheres to a systematic strategy for completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar which is in line with GNDU schedule.
- IQAC of the College ensures the proper and timely completion of syllabus by all departments.

- For the students who do not perform well in midterm exams or are slow learners, tutorials are planned and they are helped to get their syllabus completed.

The College facilitates its students in all possible ways to make them IT literate and techno savvy. All the departments which have Computer Science as a part of their curriculum have their own computer labs. Other departments access the computers and internet facility as per the arrangements made in the timetable. The students as well as the faculty have access to ultra modern computer and IT labs, professionally equipped Multimedia labs, ICT enabled Physics, Physiotherapy, Fashion Make-Over, Photography, Design labs and Music, Dance Theatre and Fine Arts Studios equipped with 326 computers. These labs stand out on account of their latest equipment. Besides, the college has laptops, printers, scanners, projectors, smart boards, visualizers and conference kit. The whole college is **wifi** enabled with 18 Mbps bandwidth. In addition, there are facilities like that of a printer, scanner and a photocopier. Students make use of these facilities for preparing their assignments, presentations as well as project works. Besides ultra modern computer labs and other departmental labs, there are 12 computers with internet connection in both the wings of the library to enable the students have free access to IT facility. The College has a variety of courses and computers, as a subject, have become part & parcel of all the areas of study. So, ever year new computers and accessories are purchased. There is a full time Network Administrator of the College.

#### 4.4.2 There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc.

##### **Response:**

The College ensures the availability of latest equipment and up-to-date infrastructure in the campus. There is a systematic procedure for the purchase as well as maintenance of these infrastructural facilities including all sorts of equipments which is as follows:

- Submission of requirement in the form of a proposal
- Evaluation by Purchase Committee and Maintenance Committee
- Approval by the Principal
- Call for quotations and verification of prices and availability of the items
- Approval from the Management
- At the end of financial year stock verification is undertaken for various departments and a detailed

report is compiled. Based on this policy the perspective plan for the maintenance, repair, writing off and purchase of relevant infrastructure facilities is formulated(refer web site)

- The College Administrative Officer regularly monitors and supervises the available infrastructure and ensures its upkeep, repair and other maintenance of the infrastructure.
- There are various committees in the college which are dedicated to the maintenance and upkeep of the institution. These include Cleanliness Committee, Campus Beautification Committee, Eco Club etc.
- There are incharges of various computer labs, multimedia lab, home sc. lab, sculpture lab, textile workshop, carpentry workshop, fine arts studio, sound studio, music recording room, CAD Lab and Chroma studio who are wholly responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of inventories and stock. They maintain a stock register and conduct annual stock checking of their respective departments.
- There are two wings of library in the college- Main Library and IT Library with separate incharges. They regularly monitor the condition of the library stock, maintain rare books collection, coordinate the timing of issue and collection of books, issuing of library cards and identity cards. The Librarian channelizes the requirement of books and journals submitted by various head of departments and their timely purchase to facilitate the smooth running of the academic sessions.
- The Sports Head regularly conducts trials for the freshers to encourage them to participate in sports activities, besides coordinating various sports activities in the college.
- The Interior Design Department of the College also facilitates in the beautification of the campus. Expert advice and guidance of well known interior designers from outside is also sought as and when required.
- Round the clock Security of the College aids in keeping the College infrastructure secure.
- Day to day maintenance is also ensured by the support staff specially outsourced for the purpose, apart from the regular support staff.
- Tie-ups with service providers ensure infrastructural updation.
- The sensitive equipment like electricity, generators, water motors, submersible pumps etc. have been installed in the outer vicinity of the College out of reach of the students.
- SERVO has been installed to check voltage fluctuation. In fact there has never been any problem of voltage fluctuation in the College campus.
- Fire Extinguishers have been installed at identified locations.
- Safe and Clean Drinking Water is ensured through ROs and Water Coolers.
- In order to ensure constant water supply, two submersible pumps have been installed aligned with two motors. Even if one breaks down the other is available as a backup.

## **Governing Body**

The function of the Cell is to look into the complaints by any staff member and judge its credentials. It promptly attends grievances from the staff members and reports to the authority about the cases received so that immediate action can be taken.

- **Mechanism**

The grievance of the individual is given a fair reasonable opportunity to be heard in detail before the Dean of the cell and other members of the concerned committee in a peaceful and conciliatory environment. Depending upon the issue, if need be, appropriate evidence in form of a material witness or personal witness is introduced by the aggrieved person. Finally the Dean SGR Cell, in consultation with the members submits the report to the higher authority at the earliest possible time.

- **Action Taken**

The higher authority in turn depending upon nature, magnitude and jurisdiction of the issue, arranges for the appropriate and early measure of redressal of grievance under the Management and the same is communicated to the aggrieved person.

#### MECHANISM FOR SETTLING AUDIT OBJECTION

The internal audit is an in house continuous process in addition to the external auditors to verify and certify the entire income, expenditure and the capital expenditure of the Institute each year. Qualified internal auditors are appointed by the Management and they assist the accounts staff by a thorough checking and verification of all the accounting vouchers and payment transactions throughout the year. Likewise and elaborated an external audit is carried out on quarterly basis. The accounts are regularly audited by both internal and statutory auditors and there are no major findings or objections so far. Minor errors or omissions pointed out by the audit team are immediately corrected / rectified and precautionary steps are taken to avoid reoccurrence of such errors in future.

**1. Safety and Security-** The entire campus is under CCTV surveillance. There is a CCTV monitoring mechanism for which there is a dedicated monitoring room supported with a moderator. Access to CCTV coverage is available in principal office also. The Coverage is an added benefit facilitating the smooth functioning of the College in a number of ways ensuring strict discipline and decorum amongst students and faculty and the proper utilization of expensive college equipment and infrastructural facilities. The Coverage also enables the principal to effectively monitor the different accessible and inaccessible areas of the College and issue prompt directives whenever and wherever necessary. This is a major step in the direction of ensuring the safety of the girl students in the college. Students are issued identity cards in the beginning of the session. Entry to campus is not permissible without Identity Card. No unauthorised person is allowed to enter the college. Outsiders are allowed only through entry pass for a specific period of time. For safety within the campus, discipline duties are allocated to teachers in every period who take rounds of the campus and different blocks. Security guards, both male and female are also posted on duty at different venues within the College.

**2. Counselling-** The SWA of the College has a Women's Cell. The teachers-members of SWA

sensitize the girls of the College about the common issues. They attend to the complaints of the girls, if any, and take appropriate measures and counsel them. As and when required, counselling is done by Counselling Cell of the Psychology Department to change the mental set up of the students. As such the Code of Conduct of College for the same has never led any matter pop-up till date. Sexual Harassment Cell has also been formed. The Principal, Dean, Sexual Harassment Cell and Dean, Student Welfare Association (SWA) are directly concerned with the complaints and issues related to sexual harassment. The college has a provision to counsel the girl students regarding girls related health issues. Learned doctors and concerned physicians, gynecologists, skin specialists, dieticians are invited from time to time to counsel the girl students in special counseling sessions arranged for the girls. They are also given tips in fashion styling, hair doing etc. Professional counseling is also offered to the girl students for becoming self reliant and for pursuing a sound career.

3. **Common Room-** The college has a separate fully air conditioned Common Room for girls where they can relax during their free periods.

### 7.1.5 Waste Management steps including:

#### Response:

- **Solid waste management** - Proper solid waste management practices are adopted in the college. The biodegradable waste is thrown in green dustbins and non biodegradable waste is thrown in red dustbins. The college campus is well kempt with no garbage littered around. Even inside the labs, aesthetically designed dustbins have been placed. The college lawns are manicured and kept in proper shape by proper disposal of biodegradable waste. Pits are dug to dump the waste inside the selected spots in the ground. Biomass is created out of dumped waste and used as manure for fertilizing the plants growing in the college lawns. Awareness among students is created time to time about this practice through posters and lectures on environment conservation. The entire waste is monitored, collected, differentiated into organic and inorganic and transported to municipality garbage dumps in different lots from where it is processed further. This practice has contributed towards healthy and hygienic environment in the college.
- **Liquid waste management** - Entire liquid waste is discharged to drains which is further transferred to municipality's sewerage system. There is proper sewerage system in the washrooms which carry liquid waste to the main sewerage. Sewerages are cleaned at regular intervals to ensure a hygienic and clean campus with absolutely no stench.
- **E-Waste Management**- The computers and other ancillary equipment which are no longer in use, are returned to vendors under Buyback Schemes and new systems are purchased in exchange of the returned systems. Some computers are refurbished for reuse internally or for charitable purposes.

### 7.1.6 Rain water harvesting structures and utilization in the campus

#### Response:

Rainwater Harvesting is an effective and eco friendly method of reducing water consumption. The institute has adopted rainwater harvesting system in the main ground of the campus. The rainwater is collected and redirected to a deep pit through drains and pipes and accumulated there. The accumulated rainwater is stored there in the tank and reused for watering the plants, ground and other pursuits. through sprinklers. It has helped to save water and led to reduced water bills. Overall this system has benefitted the institution.

The ground is of 150' x 70' size. The tank is of 10' x 10' x 10' capacity. Its a good initiative taken in the direction of sustainable environment for it can contribute in preserving underground water which is fast depleting due to the over consumption of water specially in punjab where much water is used for irrigational purposes.

Environment consciousness is the major concern of the college. The objective is to maintain the immaculate artistic ambience and beauty of the college to provide a congenial atmosphere for the academic and non-academic pursuits. Students & Staff using

- **Plastic free campus** - The students and staff members are not allowed to use polythene within the campus. Students are apprised in the beginning as well as periodically of the session about the hazards of the plastics. The entire campus is plastic free. Use of plastic bags is prohibited in Canteen and Book Shop. Paper plates, glasses and paper bags are used for serving food and delivering other items in the canteen and book shop.
- **Paperless office** - The communication with University, Head Office and other offices is made through emails. The information regarding admissions is communicated electronically. Admission notice is publicized through website and other electronic means rather than pamphlets. Prospectus can be downloaded from the website. The examination forms and details of students are uploaded on the portal of the university. Report cards are also not sent by printing, rather they are uploaded on MOODLE- Online learning portal of the college. Parents can also access it. Minimum proportion of work is done through papers. The payment of tax of staff members, payment of GST, deposit in Provident fund etc. are done through software and online portals. For Accounting and record keeping, accounting software like Tally are used. Use of paper is minimal.
- **Green landscaping with trees and plants**- The building is surrounded by lawns and beautiful trees. Tree plantation is conducted from time to time to create clean and green campus. NSS and SWA play a very important role in environment conservation. Various ornamental and shady trees have been planted in the campus. Terrace garden was developed in C Block of main building to maintain greenery on every floor and it is surrounded by beautiful plants. Saplings are planted by guests on functions to increase greenery. Also a green belt has been created on the main road to increase greenery and environment conservation. A herbal garden has also been developed. Time to time, exhibitions on rare plants are organised in the campus.

### **7.1.18 Institution organizes national festivals and birth / death anniversaries of the great Indian personalities**

#### **Response:**

Yes. The Institution celebrates national festivals and birth/death anniversaries of great Indian Personalities. Different activities are conducted like Paper Presentation, Poster Making, Debate, Poetical recitation, Declamation etc. to celebrate National Festivals like Independence Day & Republic Day. Powerpoint Presentation competitions on principles/teachings of great personalities are conducted from time to time. Teacher's day is celebrated every year to mark the birth anniversary of Dr. Sarvepalli Radhakrishnan. National Unity Day is celebrated on birth anniversary of Sardar Vallabh Bhai Patel. Hindi Diwas is also celebrated for promotion of National language. Hence, it increases consciousness about national identities and symbols and other constitutional obligations among the students.

Documentaries on the lives of great Indian personalities are produced by the students of BMM and are shown to the students. Also, choreographies with relevant theme and concept are made and staged on such important occasion highlighting the great lives of national heroes. Exhibitions are organised to mark the national days. Students get deep insight about the history of India's freedom movement and exemplary lives of great persons. It evokes feeling of patriotism among students. Students of the college participate and perform during Independence Day and Republic Day functions. Movies based on the lives of great Indian personalities are shown to students.

#### **Proceedings of the Republic Day Celebrations for Illustration:**

Republic day was celebrated with full zeal and zest in the college lawns. The students performed group dance and presented a choreography on patriotism. To inculcate the patriotic feeling, students of the Department of Music ignited the feelings of patriotism in the audience by reciting melodious tunes. The youngsters were acquainted with the value of Indian Constitution and the rights of common man which they can avail in this democracy. A quiz based on the historical and political context of Republic Day was also organized which acquainted the students with the traits of an Independent nation.

### **7.1.19 The institution maintains complete transparency in its financial, academic, administrative and auxiliary functions**

#### **Response:**

Yes. The institution maintains complete transparency in its financial, academic, administrative and auxiliary functions. Being democratic in nature, the organizational structure is decentralized. The fee is collected through cheques, drafts or online transactions. The details of fee and any other further charges to

be borne by the students are informed to them in advance at the time of admission. The accounts are audited. There is a team of internal auditors who bring a systematic and disciplined approach to record keeping. It helps to improve control and governance process. Admission process is transparent. The college website covers entire details regarding the various programmes being offered and number of available seats. Various percentage cut offs are laid down for different courses and accordingly the students are given admission. For certain professional courses interviews are conducted to judge students' aptitude for the course. The prospective candidates are judged on the basis of specific parameters which are brought to their notice prior to admission. List of selected students is displayed for admission. Report cards of students depicting their academic performance and attendance are sent through mail. Time to time Parent-teacher meetings are conducted to keep the parents updated about their wards' performance. Even, the parents can have access to MOODLE. For management and administration, different committees are formed. For different posts like head boy, head girl and the similar, elections are held after proper screening. Different prizes and awards are given to students by a panel of independent experts from different fields. All the staff members are member of different committees. All the work is decentralised. Decisions are taken by Principal in consultation with Deans of committees and committee members. Various posts to students are assigned through proper interviews and screening. This is how transparency is ensured in the various functions.
